



OK, we're not promising you'll see the sunset over the horizon like at the sea. But we promise you'll love messing about in the water and making sandcastles. Without the salt, jellyfish and outrageously expensive ice cream! What else?

Space and trees that give you "real shade"!

• Find yourself in the Haute-Loire's mini Canada: Lac du Bouchet.


Listen to nature at its purest, reigning in and around this crater lake from an old volcano. Slip from the forest to the leafy beach among the fireweed and forget-me-nots that burst from this forest paradise. After a dip it's time to tackle the lake. What are the options? Pedalos, paddles and even e-bikes. You can take an electric quadricycle to the lake from the village of Le Bouchet-Saint-Nicolas: good times guaranteed!

The "Pavillon Bleu" flag flies over this little spot in recognition of top quality water and exemplary environment management. The same goes for the lake in **Champagnac-le-Vieux** within the Livradois-Forez Regional Nature Park.

• Get bamboozled on Lac de Lavalette:

swimming, pedaloing, paddling, canoeing, rowing, cycling on an e-bike and even sailing on 220 hectares of pure water. The madder you are, the more fun you have so grab your friends and family to try the giant paddle or dragon boat: a dugout with a drummer, helmsman and rowers. Row to the beat of the drum and have a go at water jousting too!







Pools like you've never seen before

- Have a go at breaststroke without your eyes stinging in the turquoise **organic lake** in Saugues.
- Take in the jaw-dropping view from cliffside pools on the Gorges de l'Allier and **B&Bs like Art & Création** in Saint-Bérain (photo) and **Clair Matin** in Villeneuve-d'Allier: Françoise and Dominique have set up cosy homes from home by their pool with unobstructed views of Château de St-Ilpize.



The wild and intimate gorges to heighten our senses

What do the "altiligériens"* do in summer? They like to get their feet wet, among other things! Any excuse goes: a quick dip after work or an leisurely Sunday by the water. Yup, we're lucky to live in a slice of paradise packed with streaming rivers. Over 3000km peppered with natural pools, little coves with sand beaches and grassy stretches to top up your tan. Fine, we'll share them with you but "sshh!"

OUR MUST-DOS

- Feel small as you mess around under the 90m-high cliff of basalt columns formed by par 4 lava flows in Prades in the Gorges de l'Allier (photo).
- Bury our feet in the sand on the beaches in Goudet and Pont de Chadron (Haute-Vallée de la Loire).
- Hunt for crayfish in the Gorges de la Loire, Gorges du Lignon or Gorges de la Borne.
- Canoe down the Gorges de la Loire and Gorges de l'Allier or go rafting to Monistrol-d'Allier.



Hot springs to chill out

COSY LITTLE HOMES FROM HOME

- The hot tub with quirky accommodation in La Roche aux Fées in Lapte, Gîtes des Pins in La Chapelle d'Aurec or Les Fustes en Pays du Mézenc in Fay-sur-Lignon (photo).
- Wellness at spas or heated pools all year at Gîte La Source in St-Christophe-d'Allier, Domaine Saint-Roch in Salzuit, Le Fort du Pré Hotel & Restaurant in St-Bonnet-le-Froid or Hôtel La Découverte in Les Estables.



Venturing off the beaten track means choosing another way to paddle. So we're leaving the overcrowded waterways to go on a real adventure: one which opens our eyes to the world so we can get to grips with our surroundings.



SECRETS OF THE STONES

This boat is undoubtedly the most natural way to see the basalt giants and stone villages that seem to watch over the furrowed Gorges de l'Allier. Then we stop for a coffee on the sun-soaked banks of Lavoûte-Chilhac and a stroll in Vieille-Brioude's parks. We set off from Bageasse beach with a guide on a nautical trail® to find out more about these waters teeming with salmon.

Ages 6 and up. Half-day, full day or 3-day trip from Prades to Auzon: 20/25km per day (approx. 5 hrs). Accommodation in B&Bs, stopover gîtes or campsites. Solo or guided village tours.

RIVER EXPLORER

If you see a canoe with some funny explorers on board with thermometers in one hand and nets and masks in the other: stop! It's Allierypso: a floating scientific base jam-packed with fun-filled educational equipment. A beaver skull is unearthed and the investigation into the rodent begins. Tracks on the beach spark our curiosity that draws us to the semi-aquatic mammals. A discussion about water levels and the river's hydrology is clear as crystal.

Look out for them in summer as you go round a bend between Langeac and Brioude (Les Pieds à Terre)

SAILING THROUGH UNTAMED TERRITORY

Jérôme is passionate about the Gorges de la Loire and it's obvious. When he joins your «canoe» trip it's like he's opening the doors into his own wild land that he wants to protect. He tells us the story of otters, red kites and snowy mespilus. As we're paddling along we can see the natural symbiosis that we're quietly caught up in.



FLIRT WITH THE RAPIDS

Go rafting with Olivier on a thrilling adventure in the Gorges de l'Allier. This river is almost inaccessible. On the agenda: white-water rapids, splashing about to your heart's content and stops to dive off the granite rock before a picnic on the sand and pebble beach. The afternoon is more chilled out with a canoe ride down calmer water to Langeac. Then it's a train ride back to Monistrol-d'Allier whilst we relive our exciting adventure.

RECONNECT WITH MOTHER Mature

Here, all roads lead to the source. A source of stamina with trails flirting with the Loire and Allier, 2 rivers that spring up on the edge of the Haute-Loire... or a source of spirituality and history with the Santiago de Compostela route.

Walking these footpaths is a great way to recharge your batteries: go back to basics, reconnect with nature and, along the way, get back to your own nature.

THE LOIRE, THE GREAT OUTDOORS

Everyone in France learns in geography class that the Loire River's source is on Mont Gerbier-de-Jonc. So why not go back up the river right to its source or set off from the source along the wildest part of the Loire?

There are 2 options on a 180km route on the GR® 3 footpath from Mont Gerbier-de-Jonc to the Barrage de Grangent dam. Explore the wildest part of the Loire: it carves out a path winding between rocks, Scotch pines and broom where rare birds like the short-toed snake eagle and peregrine falcon nest.

Along the way you can see the first Loire châteaux standing guard over Europe's last wild river.

Along the way don't forget to fill the cup of your hands with its clear water to freshen up and set off again with your best foot forward.

IN STEVENSON'S FOOTSTEPS

How about reliving the Scottish writer Robert Louis Stevenson's adventure? He set off from the foot of Monastier-sur-Gazeille in 1878 with his donkey Modestine to cross the volcanic landscapes of the Velay and Cévennes covering 220km in 12 days to Saint Jean-du-Gard. Join the trekking pioneer on a hiking trail named after him. "I travel not to go anywhere, but to go." Don't forget to pack the story of his journey, Travels with a Donkey in the Cévennes, in your bag for your hike.

DIGITAL GR® HIKING TRAIL

Pack light with the first digital pocket hiking guide. It's free too! It guides us as we follow the Allier back up to Brioude to its source at an altitude of 1500m on Moure de la Gardille in Lozère. Hiking the "Sources & Gorges de l'Allier" GR® 470 trail is an ode to landscapes that are as diverse as they are dramatic: rows of gorges, hairpin bends, granite and basalt plateaus, volcanic curiosities, stunning resinous or leafy forests and more. To end the trip on a high, a train ride back along the river on the legendary Le Cévenol railway is a must.


And there are lots of them in Haute-Loire, you'll see!

- > Bastien's favourite? **Zip-lining**. He's such a big fan that he's set up twentyodd covering 1.5km above the Gorges de Chamalières-sur-Loire (Tyro sur Loire)
- > Philippe set himself quite a challenge: to send you hurtling down the Mézenc on a **sled** even when there's no snow with a rail system reaching speeds of 40km/hr! (luqikparc.com)
- > Kévin is sure of one thing: you won't be able to resist the magical Pradelle volcanic landscapes on board his electric **railbike** (www.velorail43.com).




climb to the top

> A mini army of professionals await in no less than **7 treetop adventure parks** in the Haute-Loire's forests. Our must-dos?

The park that ends with zip-lines over the Allier in Langeac, the super-challenging park and panoramic platform in Chambon-sur-Lignon, workshops with views of Le Puy-en-Velay and "Bois des Gaulois" in Saint-Paulien: a park with treehouses connected by nets. Suitable for over 2s without harnesses, little ones end their big adventure on a 23m long slide. That's right, they're in for a thrilling treat too!

LAFAYETTE, FROM THE HAUTE-**LOIRE TO AMERICA**

How about we get to know the famous Marquis de Lafayette, a hero in 2 countries and a champion of freedom? The "honorary citizen of the United States of America" was born on September 6th 1757 in the Château de Chavaniac-Lafayette. 1777 marked the beginning of his American saga. Alongside George Washington, he became an «iconic» figure for American independence. When he returned to France he played a major part in the French Revolution in 1789 which he threw himself into with ideas he'd brought back from the USA. The Treasury Room even has an original copy of the Marquis' Declaration of the Rights of the Man and of the Citizen. A 300 year old oak tree that has borne witness to the saga stands in the middle of the château grounds.

HOMAGE TO THE RIGHTEOUS

Did you know that the tradition for hospitality and spirit of resistance in and around Le Chambon-sur-Lignon really came to the fore during the Second World War?

The villages quietly and naturally transformed following the influx of refugees with almost as many refugees as there were households. Countless Jews and specifically children were saved among the refugees. In 1990, people from in and around Chambon were given a Yad Vashem certificate of honour that distinguishes them as "Righteous

Among The Nations".

You can explore this period on a historical and educational visit to the remarkable Lieu de Mémoire Museum in Le Chambon-sur-Lignon. A moving journey that encapsulates the fate of the men and women involved in the resistance that was civil, spiritual and armed all in one.

PEAK OF THE RESISTANCE

Let's visit the Mont-Mouchet Resistance Museum in Auvers. The tale of two cartoon characters, Lucien and Pierrot, depicts the key events that made their mark on this Auvergne resistance memorial site in a sensitive playful way. The 2 heroes joined the Mont-Mouchet group, one of the 5 largest resistance gatherings in France, in spring 1944. What did they do? They stopped the German army from advancing from their base in the South of France to Normandy. Authentic items, documents, photos and videos surround us with the realities of the time and reveal the secrets of the Auvergne Resistance throughout the visit.

How about a stroll around Brioude's streets? On top of the stunning Saint-Julien Basilica adorned by contemporary stainedglass windows by Kim En Joong, the town is teeming with treasures to uncover.

INSPIRATION NOTEBOOK

Saint-Julien Basilica

The breath-taking basilica will blow you away! Auvergne's biggest Romanesque church stands out for its concentric apse and polychrome stones that inspire watercolour painters. The basilica has earned 3 stars in the Michelin Green Guide and is the heart of the town: side porches and pebbles play host to the artists you'll see bent over their work.

Draw me the old town

Streets lined with amazing buildings, some of which date back to the 15th century, cross paths around the basilica. Soak up the Southern French vibes as you wander the streets around Places aux Herbes and Place Grégoire de Tours.

Corbelled houses and old boutiques

Turrets, sculpted doors, half-timbered houses and wrought iron balconies on old houses spark the imagination! One house in particular grabs your attention with its air of scandal: Maison de Mandrin, the home of a famous smuggler in the 18th century. The walls are also home to old boutiques, bygone trades and café fronts in burnished hues.

Every two years in July, Brioude becomes the muse for watercolour and sketchbook artists with the Biennale d'Aquarelle de Brioude. Fifty-odd international artists, watercolour classes, group pieces, performances and conferences. biennale-aquarelle.com ot-brioude.fr

Delve into these Brioude ideas, experience other artforms and meet the Salmon King.

HDLD - Hôtel de la Dentelle

For people who are good with their hands and have a soft touch, lace is a revived art form that HDLD has propelled into the contemporary and polychrome world. Like a piece of architecture, you can see the work in all its glory and the luxury of silk in haute-couture pieces.

Le Doyenné

Le Doyenné is a fully-fledged historical site with its emblazoned ceiling that is now a contemporary art centre. Le Doyenné opened in 2018 to host exhibitions by major artists such as Chagall, Miro and Nicolas de Staël in 2020.

Aquarium Maison du Saumon et de la Rivière (Salmon and River Centre)

Learn everything there is to know about this great migrator that still lives in the Allier River. The aquarium is home to 40 species of fish that shimmer before your very eyes. Unleash your inner biologist in the lab to perfect your knowledge of these aquatic creatures.

BECAUSE

THIS ABBEY IS A GEM

You feel so small when you step into the huge Benedictine abbey, an Auvergne heritage gem: after gazing at the 40pipe organ you can stealthily sneak under the stone jube dominating the nave. Clément VI's tomb watches over the site and awaits us. Then head off to decipher the 26m long macabre dance. There's so much to see... But joining Isabelle makes a world of difference! With her cheeky spirit, she draws our attention to the small details that make the place so special. Like the funny little heads that adorn the 140 oak stalls dating back to the 15th century. The French even have a funny name for these corbels: culs de lampes (translation: lamp bums)!





BECAUSE THERE'S

A ROOM WITH

MYSTERIOUS ACOUSTICS

"Who is your lover?" is the **fateful** question that Lubin asked his big brother to test the Echo Room's privacy. Whether the architects put in some precise planning to do this or whether it's pure chance, the room's function is still unknown. But that only adds to the mystery surrounding this fun-filled sound experience.



A NATIONAL TREASURE

A one-of-a-kind hanging with 14 tapestries from the 16th century depicting a series of episodes from the life of Christ and the Virgin Mary has recently found a spot befitting its grandeur: the former Notre-Dame du Collège Chapel unearthed by chance during work in 2010. The tapestries were primped for 7 years (no joke!) to give them a new lease of life during their restoration. One of them dropped 7kg in weight from dust and damp! Xavier the guide is unbeatable when it comes to this antique comic strip. He takes us back to the turbulent past to make sense of every little woven detail.

BECAUSE YOU CAN

RUN INTO MONKS

We met Jean-Théophane and had a coffee with.... a cake in his likeness!

The chatty and friendly monk told us about everyday life with 7 other brothers in the community. They have to pray for at least 5 hours a day! During a walk in the village he explained why gargoyles warded evil away from the building. He drew our attention to these strange stone faces sculpted on houses. He taught us why the French expression "donner un coup de collier" (put your back into it) took on its full meaning in 18th century La Chaise-Dieu... We won't tell! We'll let you ask the people you meet in this

authentic village yourself.








BECAUSE THERE'S LOTS OF THINGS TO DO WITH THE FAMILY

Elisa, Lubin, Gabriel and Mathis were the first to try the tour in costume (designed by a local design studio darling!). Abracadabra: gripping their fun-filled notebooks, they only had eyes for La Chaise-Dieu. Then there was a choice of: models for a better insight into gothic architecture, learning about the life of a monk and wildlife at the abbey's "zoo".

Since there's more to life than heritage, we took this little group for a dip and ice cream on the sand by the lake a few miles from the village. There was even time for a pedalo race. But we'll need to come back for a run around the surround woods, to try the open-top train and watch the shows at the Cziffra auditorium: theatre, music, dance, there's something on all year round!


10AM: MARKET, PLACE DU PLOT

Our host, Pierre, told us to head to the heart of town and venture to Place du Plot, "Saturday is market day! " The square is packed with farmers and as you get closer you can't resist sampling their local produce: "artisous" cheese, fresh goat's cheese, saucisson, honey, lentils and more.



12PM: MARKET SPECIAL, PLACE DU MARCHÉ COUVERT

All the mouth-watering flavours whet our appetite so our foodie adventure leads us to Place du Marché Couvert, popular with local producers and farmers where nearby restaurateurs come to stock up. The square is buzzing with life and locals who come to meet up with friends on the restaurant terraces where you have to use your elbows to grab a drink or order the market special.




2PM: UPTOWN

Now we're ready to explore the town and its treasures! We leave Place du Plot and wander along the cobbled lanes uptown. The street comes out onto Place des Tables with lace and souvenir shops with a retro vibe. Bobbin lace is a well-established tradition and you can see lacemakers bent over their pillows.

Place des Tables gives us a great low-angle shot of the cathedral. The Romanesque cathedral draws on myriad influences from the East to Moor Spain and its ochre hues and arcades are a sight for sore eyes.

We're treated to one of the best views of the city when we reach the forecourt. The cloister clings to the side of the cathedral with jaw-droppingly beautiful mosaics in white, red and black diamonds.

The Notre-Dame-de-France Statue stands behind the cathedral watching over the city. We drink in 360° views with a trip up to the crown with our heads in the clouds! On the way back down, we stop for a coffee with mini desserts in the lovely grounds at Le Camino Museum. Next, we feast our eyes on Rue Chènebouterie which turns into "Arts Street" in summer with designer and artisan pop-up shops.



Be blown away by Le Puy-en-Velay (rated 3* in the Michelin Green Guide), the European capital of the Camino de Santiago, UNESCO World Heritage. A city that's even more magical at nightfall with the Puy de Lumières illuminations




7PM: UNWIND ON THE TERRACE, PLACE DU CLAUZEL

10PM: PUY DE LUMIÈRES CITY ILLUMINATIONS




SELECTION

ARLEMPDES

Arlempdes and its château lean against a basalt peak as a beacon over the wild Gorges de la Loire. Like a quardian for this natural temple, we borrow the keys to the château from Le Manoir restaurant to unlock the secret.

PRADELLES

IS SAINT-BONNET THE MOST FOODIE VILLAGE IN FRANCE?

What sets Saint-Bonnet-le-Froid apart is the standard of its restaurants with a record number of eateries and culinary awards. Let's find out more about an incredible area from Marie-France Neyron, a "keeper of memory" for this collective adventure.

So tell me...how do you explain the incredible restaurant scene in Saint Bonnet?

It all stems from Saint-Bonnet's location almost 1200 m high at the top of a mountain pass on the edge of the Ardèche and Haute-Loire. Monks from La Chaise-Dieu came here to clear the ground in the Middle Ages. So you needed cafés and taverns for the men clearing the ground. Then stagecoaches began to stop in Saint-Bonnet to eat and sleep. It all began because there was nothing at all...

And then?

Locals stayed here. An example is Chef Thierry Guyot and his wife Cécile at Le Fort du Pré who hail from the Lot region. We're used to seeing snowy winters here. There's a real sense of community. Restaurateurs aren't competitive. They're pleased to see others do well and everyone does well! [laughs].

Chef Régis Marcon must have helped the village become famous?

Régis wasn't going to live in Saint-Bonnet to start with. The Gault et Millau guide brought him to the world's attention. He was offered jobs in Paris, Vichy, and in the end he never wanted to leave his land. He brought a lot of people with him. At the start we couldn't believe it. Then he trained lots of chefs who have stayed here such as 2 Michelin-starred Serge Vieira in Chaudes-Aigues. Régis is proud...He's a driving force, he attracts others, he's very friendly: we never say «Mr Marcon» here, **everyone calls him Régis.**

Why did Régis introduce mushrooms into his dishes?


Here we have a mushroom legacy and the tradition of the mushroom fair that's been running since the Middle Ages. People would pick mushrooms and dry them on ropes in front of the fire in farms. Mushrooms sold for the same price as today at the All Saint's Day fair. They would swap goods with traders for warm clothes, chestnuts, nuts and apples to get through winter. It was a way to survive. The 2-day fair now attracts 40.000 visitors.

Is Saint-Bonnet the land of mushrooms?

Undoubtedly! It's down to its wealth of woodlands, diverse soils and surrounding altitudes: it increases the opportunities!




